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Gladys Black, Iowa's Bird Lady, Dies at 89

Gladys Black died Sunday, July 19 at her home

in Pleasantville. She was 89. Best known for her bird articles that appeared in the Des Moines Register, they were collectively published in 1992 in "Iowa's Birdlife."

She was awarded an Honorary Degree by Simpson College for her ornithological

investigations and was inducted into the Iowa Woman's Hall of Fame in 1985.

She was an Honorary Member of both the Des Moines Audubon Society and the Iowa Ornithologists' Union. She was only one of three members of the IOU to receive this honor.

A Gladys Black Memorial Fund has been established at the Pleasantville State Bank, 102 N. Washington, Pleasantville, IA 50225. Money sent to her memorial fund will be used to support her environmental interests.

The Birds of Story County

Steve Dinsmore and Hank Zaletel have recently published the second edition of the Birds of Story County. Funded by the Big Bluestem Audubon of Ames, it is an annotated list of the 301 species of birds recorded in Story County through May of 1998. It included information about seasonal abundance, breeding and historical status, early and late

Hopefully this material may provide some guidance when the atlas is redone in 20 years.

DeLorme Atlas Available for Iowa

Iowa Atlas and Gazetteer. DeLorme, Yarmouth, Maine, 1998, 64 pp., \$16.95. For those not familiar with them, DeLorme atlases are a series of state atlases featuring fairly detailed colored topographic maps. For Iowa, 51 maps, each featuring part or all of several counties show the familar gridwork of Iowa's roads, including rural roads, superimposed on a topographic background. Because many Iowa birders now use the Iowa Sportsman's Atlas maps, comparisons between the two are inevitable.

The relief lines on Iowa's relatively flat landscape are not very prominent, and this feature is not particularly useful for most of Iowa. I found that the drainage patterns (rivers, creeks, etc) and towns stand out particularly well on the DeLorme maps. Also, the larger scale view of the DeLorme maps gives a better perspective of where you are than with the county-level maps of Sportsmans.

The DeLorme maps show many publicly owned lands (wildlife areas and refuges, state parks, state preserves, etc). However, many such areas are missing. In general, the DeLorme maps do not include county owned areas which often are important birding areas in Iowa. In addition, I noticed a number of state-owned areas, some of them publicly owned for many years, that are not identified on these maps. Many birders will find this atlas useful, especially for the "big picture" view it gives. However, for locating many birding areas, especially county areas, it is not as useful as the Sportsman's Atlas.—J.J.D.
