BLUEBIRDS IN IOWA

The 1986 Iowa Bluebird Workshop was held in Des Moines February 15. Sponsored by the Iowa Conservation Commission's Nongame Program, nearly 50 people attended. A slidetape program from the North American Bluebird Society was shown followed by an update on the bird's status here in Iowa. Nest boxes of all types were discussed and plans for many were made available. Bluebird trail enthusiasts were encouraged to submit nest cards to the Nongame program since there is little nesting information available for Iowa.

Two IOU members, Dick Bierman and Gil Sandvick, have started and maintained successful Bluebird trails. We have asked them to tell of their experience. Dick Bierman is from Cherokee in northwest Iowa: "About 1978 I had the good fortune to take over the maintenance and care of a Bluebird trail in Cherokee County. The trail consisted of about 35 maintained houses that had been in operation for about 20 years. So, I already had a good population of Bluebirds. With the help of Marion Brewer and Vernie Bierman, we have expanded the number of houses to around 150. We clean them in March and try to check them every two weeks or so through mid-September.

Our boxes are located in Cherokee County along the Little Sioux River along highway right-of-ways and in County Conservation Board areas. We try to locate our boxes in pastured areas away from brush and heavy timber to discourage wrens from using the boxes. Boxes are on a steel post about 5 feet off the ground. We have experimented with various types and designs of houses. Our luck with the open top boxes has been marginal. The best box to keep predators out seems to be the Audubon style except we use a $l^{\frac{1}{2}}$ " diameter hole instead of a slot.

Our fledge rate through the years would probably be about 50%. Various reasons for failure would include: competition with wrens or other birds, predation, poisoning, and parasites. In 1985 110 Bluebirds fledged from our boxes."

Gil Sandvick is from Long Grove in eastern Iowa: "I became interested in Bluebirds about 5 years ago when I learned of their rapidly decreasing numbers. Most people under the age of 50 have never seen our Eastern Bluebird.

My trail is located in the McCausland/Princeton, Iowa area in Scott and Clinton counties. It consists of 24 nesting boxes that I monitor weekly. Open pastureland with trees in the background, away from all buildings, makes for the best nest box location. Last year was my best year as 51 babies were successfully fledged."



BLUEBIRDS (cont'd)

The North American Bluebird Society was organized to alert the public to the slow, but gradual disappearance of the Bluebird due to lack of suitable nesting cavities and severe weather. It also encourages the establishment of bluebird trails and maintenance of scientific records of nesting. The Society acts as a clearinghouse for this data. PHILIP DUMONT PAPERS

During the 1930s, Philip A. DuMont was probably the most active ornithologist working in Iowa. His greatest contribution was his comprehensive Birds of Iowa, for over 30 years the best summary of information on Iowa birds. He also was active in the conservation movement in Iowa. From Iowa, he went to work for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service where he had a long career, mostly working with national wildlife refuges. Now retired, he has donated many of his papers to the Iowa State University Library. These papers consist of reprints of DuMont's papers on Iowa birds, papers by others such as Althea Sherman, T.C. Stephens, William Youngworth, and Paul Errington on Iowa birds, and a number of other papers on Midwest birds. There also are some notes on unfinished manuscripts of DuMont. The whole collection is in the Special Collections section at Iowa State where it is available for study.

We need records of breeding locations. Data should include: type of observation, singing male, nest with eggs, etc.; location as precise as possible, preferably township/range/section; habitat type; date of observation; ownership if known.

ATLAS PROJECT

The results of the first year of the Iowa Breeding Bird Atlas are gradually coming in. To date, about 120 blocks have had some coverage, and at least 13 have sufficient coverage to be considered done. At least 41 counties have had some coverage. Surprisingly, most of the work has been in the northwest half of Iowa. About 100 people have participated. Over 60% of the species found in the completed blocks are either confirmed or probable nesters, the most valuable categories of information. Some of the more interesting finds were Burrowing Owl, Northern Harrier, Ringnecked Duck, Least Bittern, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Common Barn-Owl (2 blocks), Louisiana Waterthrush, and Northern Parula. Some common species (American Robin, Mourning Dove) were reported from most of the blocks while others like Loggerhead Shrike and Upland Sandpiper were on about 10% of the blocks covered.

We still have not received reports from many blocks that we think had some coverage in 1985. Please send your 1985 Atlas cards to Doug Reeves, RR 1, Ledges Road, Boone, IA 50036. We also need to increase our coverage in 1986, especially in southcentral and southeast Iowa. There are many good blocks that are untouched. Please contact your county or regional coordinator or Doug Reeves for atlas packets.
