# Bird Line Jim Fuller



The National Birding Hotline Cooperative (NBHC) is a group of birders who are sharing rare bird alerts from various parts of the country. The Iowa Birdline recently joined this group. Although all rare bird alerts are not subscribers at this time, the coverage is excellent, and includes San Diego, Los Angeles, and San Francisco, Phoenix, Tucson and southern Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, the east coast from Maine to Virginia, Indiana, Detroit, and southwest Ohio. A few of the interesting sightings this past week included Spotted Redshank in Massachusetts, Curlew Sandpiper, Rufous Necked and Long Toed Stints in the Middle Atlantic states, and Brown and Blue-footed Boobies at the Salton Sea in California.

This means that I receive weekly reports and updates on my computer. If you are planning a vacation or birding trip to another part of the country, and would like to plan your birding activities ahead of time, I would be happy to forward information from that area to you. In addition, if you are employed at an educational or research institution that has computer access to Internet-Bitnet, you can subscribe to this service, and receive the reports directly at your office. You can also subscribe to the service if you install the proper modem on your personal computer, and then receive the information at home.

# Tales of Old Birds

A recent article in the Journal of Field Ornithology lists longevity records for a number of bird species. Among them are two birds that were banded in Iowa. A Red-tailed Hawk banded by Dan Berger near Earlville on 2 December 1963 was recovered on 27 December 1983 east of Manchester. Since the bird was in at least its second year of life when it was banded, it was at least 21 years 6 months old when recovered. The other bird with Iowa ties was a Bay-breasted Warbler banded by Charles Avres at Pioneer Ridge Park, Ottumwa on 13 September 1982. This bird was recovered at Boca del Toro. Panama on 4 November 1984 and was at least 3 years 5 months old when recovered. Since very few of the birds that are banded are ever seen again, recoveries like these are very rare but they show the potential value of banding birds.

# Bald Eagle Roosts John Fleckenstein



The DNR Bureau of Preserves and Ecological Services keeps records of rare species and natural communities in Iowa. We use these records to study distribution and abundance of rare species and to protect significant locations from development. Until recently, we have only recorded breeding locations for rare birds. We are starting to record other significant locations.

We are looking for locations of Bald Eagle winter roosts. We have been able to protect several sites from development, but do not have good records for most other sites. We have some information on Mississippi River roosts but few locations on interior rivers. If you are aware of an eagle roost location, we would like to hear about it. Any site which is used consistantly by a group of birds may be significant.

If you know of a site, please send me information on location and use. A legal description and map are most useful, but mileage from the nearest town, intersection, or bridge will help locate the site. Other useful information includes period of use, average and extreme numbers of birds, and ice conditions during use.
