1995 Fall I.O.U. Meeting by Mary Kuhlman, Ft. Dodge

The Quad City Audubon Society hosted the I.O.U. Fall, 1995 meeting 8-10 September at the Wapsi River Environmental Education Center near Dixon, Iowa. The newly remodeled center is located in a beautiful wooded area along the Wapsi River on the Clinton-Scott County line. It provided a wonderful setting for the Friday night social gathering and for the meeting on Saturday.

Successful field trips were held both Saturday and Sunday mornings. Many areas were covered, including Sherman Park, Goose Lake, Eagle Point Park, Big Sand Mound Nature Preserve and others.

The Saturday afternoon program began with Carol Thompson explaining the Fish and Wildlife Diversity Funding Initiative. Members were encouraged to support this initiative which could result in over \$4 million for Iowa non-game species. This money would be generated by a five percent tax on outdoor recreation equipment. Letters of support are needed to be sent to manufacturers of outdoor equipment. Sample letters and addresses were distributed.

The program continued with Rick Nelson of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. He said reorganization is underway and with budget cuts of 11-15% there will be fewer people, fewer services and fewer land acquisitions. More volunteers will be needed.

Kelly McKay described fall warbler identification as a "frustrating and difficult experience." His helpful program included slides, songs and call notes of all 36 species of warblers. The I.O.U. fall business meeting followed the program. In one item of business, members voted to establish an ad hoc environmental committee to review environmental issues and advise the organization when I.O.U. is asked to lend support to environmental causes.

Iowa Machine Shed in Davenport was the location of the Saturday night banquet. A delicious family style meal was served. Pete Petersen entertained the group with slides from his New Zealand birding trip.

The weekend concluded after the Sunday morning field trips with lunch and compilation at Wildcat Den State Park.

Special thanks to the Quad City Audubon Society for their work on local arrangements and field trips. We hope to see Common Loon, Horned and Western Grebes, Greater Scaulp, Bonaparte's Gull, Long-eared Owl, Snow Bunting, and maybe something unusual like a Red-necked Grebe, scoter, Oldsquaw, or rare gull. THALES!



Heard on the Birdline June 15 - September 15 by Jim Fuller, Iowa City

All reports are considered hypothetical until submitted to and approved by the Records Committee.

For the third consecutive year, a bird that represented a first record for the state, appeared the first week in September. Following the Reddish Egret of 1993 and the the Long-tailed Jaeger of 1994, a juvenile White Ibis was discovered at the Hawkeye Wildlife Area on September 5 by James Huntington. The bird was subsequently seen by many as it stayed through the 16th. Another rarity which spent almost a week at the same location was a Reeve first reported by Tom Kent on August 21. There were also from 1-3 Red-necked Phalaropes at the same spot for almost a month, beginning in mid-August.

The other outstanding September sightings were all gulls. An adult Laughing Gull and a first-year California Gull were found near Swan on September by Steve Dinsmore and Jim Sinclair, and a juvenile Sabine's Gull was reported by Denny Thompson at Terra Lake in Johnston on September 6. Another Laughing Gull was at Saylorville Reservoir on August 13.

Summer nesters in June and July that created news were Prairie Warbler at Lake McBride, Mississippi Kite in the Des Moines area, and Bewick's Wren in Iowa County. Least Terns and Piping Plovers once again were found nesting at utility generating station settling ponds near Council Bluffs and Sioux City.

Additional shorebird reports that raised eyebrows were a juvenile Sharp-tailed Sandpiper at the Coralville Reservoir on July 29, Red Knots at Rathbun Reservoir on July 22 and August 13, and a Marbled Godwit near Burlington on July 14 and 28. Unusual in July were Western Grebes at Fisher Lake in Polk County, and Harrier Marsh in Boone County. Yellow-crowned Night Herons were in southwest Iowa in June, and along with Snowy Egrets and Little Blue Herons were at the Waubonsie Wildlife Area east of Nebraska City in July and August. Snowy Egrets were also at Union Slough NWR on September 14. An unusually large numbers of Black-throated Blue Warblers reports came from various eastern Iowa locations in late August and early September.

Call for Information

I am collecting sight records as part of a study of the distribution of color morphs of the Eastern Screech-Owl (Otus asio) in Iowa. Color morphs are readily distinguishable in the Eastern Screech-Owl as either rufous morphs or gray morphs. A few individuals are intermediate, but for sight records I assume these would be recorded according to the predominant color of the bird.

If you have Iowa sight records of Eastern Screech-Owls, please report them to me or request a reporting data form. The desired data are date and locality of the observation, and color morph of the bird. Even incomplete data will be useful, the minimum requirement is that the sighting must be from Iowa (county or other locality information is very desirable) and no more than one record should be given for an individual bird (i.e., avoid reporting a bird that is likely to be the same individual reported on another date).
