Keynote Speaker - Derek Lovitch How To Be A Better Birder

Using the Sandy Point (Yarmouth, Maine) Morning Flight phenomenon as a case study, Derek shares tips and takeaways for birders of all levels who want to learn how to bird like the experts. Together, we'll learn how geography, weather, and habitat combine to provide outstanding birding opportunities, maximize our time in the field, and challenge ourselves to improve our identification skills. This program takes an in-depth look at "Birding at Night" with an intro to birding by NEXRAD Radar, and showcases the bird photography of his wife, Jeannette.

Derek is a career biologist with a lifelong passion for birds, having worked on avian research and education projects in nine states from New Jersey to Hawaii and from Florida to Michigan. He also spent three summers as a tour guide on Alaska's Pribilof Islands; he served as tour director in 2003, and organized and conducted the first comprehensive Fall Avian Survey in the island's history. Derek and his wife Jeannette have settled down in Pownal, Maine, where they own and operate Freeport Wild Bird Supply, a retail store that caters to birders of all levels. The store serves as a vehicle for Derek to continue to share his enthusiasm for birding, birds, and bird conservation.

Derek serves on his town's Conservation Commission, and with Jeannette founded the Bradbury Mountain Raptor Research Project, and is active with many birding and conservation issues in Maine. He also works as a consultant, performing various bird surveys in the state. Yet somehow he still finds to time to bird just about every day: whether as a Senior Leader for WINGS, guiding for private clients, organizing pelagic trips, or simply working on his local patch list, hardly a day goes by when he isn't in the field.

Derek's first book, titled How To Be a Better Birder, was published in March 2012 by Princeton University Press. He was also the "Tools of the Trade" Department Editor for Birding Magazine for 6 years, and his writing has also appeared in Birder's World, Bird Observer, Bird Watcher's Digest, NJ Audubon, and Winging It. He is the author of A Birder's Guide to Whitefish Point (Michigan) and wrote the text and designed the Birds of the Maine Backyard folding guide. Along with birding, Derek enjoys hiking, exploring new natural areas, developing his native plant garden, and eating.

Bird(list)athon

Fundraising can be fun. We in the IOU don't seem to do much of it. Many IOU members keep an annual bird list, ranging from traversing the state to keeping a tally of yard birds.

Hence a proposal, prompted in part by my recent experience serving on the IOU Projects Committee:

- Step 1: After the first of the year, compile your 2013 list.
- **Step 2:** Pledge to contribute one dime (\$0.10) per species you found during the year.
- **Step 3:** Make a donation in said amount to IOU, specifying the Projects Committee (www.iowabirds.org/IOU/donate).

This is about as straightforward as a fundraiser can be – no need to solicit pledges from friends and colleagues, for example. You are simply transferring the fun you had birding into a positive "feel good" experience that will benefit Iowa's birds.

Each year in the Spring issue of this newsletter, Paul Hertzel publishes annual list totals of those members who choose to submit them. In 2012, had the 21 birders on this list sent in a dime per species, \$558.60 would have been raised. Birders, this would be enough money to fund a typical request by a deserving bird-focused organization.

I hope that many readers will join me next January. (My \$22.70 contribution last year would have been equivalent to half a tank of gas).

Passing of former IOU President Ed Kozicky

Edward Kozicky, President of the Iowa Ornithologists' Union from 1953-1954 died on 21 Jul 2012 in East Alton, Illinois. Born in New Jersey in 1918, Ed had a long and distinguished career in the wildlife profession. He was the leader of the Iowa Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit at Iowa State College from 1948-1956. While there he directed numerous research projects including studies of Ring-necked Pheasants and Northern Bobwhite. He spent 26 years working for Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation where he was in charge of their conservation program. In that work, he wrote extensively on conservation issues and hunter education, and received numerous awards in recognition of that work. After his November 2007 visit to Iowa, a short note describing his work and two photos were published in the Winter 2007 issue of the IOU News.
