BALD EAGLE APPRECIATION DAYS

Each winter 100 to 400 Bald Eagles winter along the Mississippi River at Keokuk. This is one of the major wintering areas in the Midwest.

To give people an opportunity to view the eagles first-hand, there will be Bald Eagle Days on January 17-19 at Keokuk, Iowa. The event will include observation areas at the river and indoor sessions at the Keosippi Mall on Main Street. Spotting scopes will be furnished, and biologists will be on hand to answer questions. Indoor sessions will be from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM and will include a live Bald Eagle.

The Quad City Audubon will hold its Bald Eagle Caravan for 1986 on January 18 and 19. The Caravan weekend includes a Saturday evening program with a film on eagles to be held at Butterworth Center, Moline, Illinois at 7:30 PM on the 18th; and field trips on Sunday, January 19 for observation. Participants will meet at 8:00 AM at the Lock 15 Visitors' enter on Arsenal Island.

EAGLE WATCHING MADE EASY - A PEARL FOR THE LAZY BIRDER

If you're in Davenport, hungry or thirsty, on a frozen mid-winter day, head for the Dock, a restaurant at the foot of Perry Street. Here you can sip a glass of wine or enjoy a gourmet meal next to a picture window overlooking the river just below the dam. Bald Eagles can almost always be found fishing 50 yards from your table or roosting in the trees on the tip of Arsenal Island directly across the river. If you prefer not to partake of food or drink, the city parking lot just west of the restaurant has plenty of spots on the edge of the levee facing the river. The view is just the same, and you can closely observe our nation's symbol from the warmth of your car.

MIDWINTER RAPTOR SURVEY

Each year since 1977, Dean Roosa, State Ecologist, has coordinated a "midwinter raptor survey" under the auspices of the State Preserves Advisory Board and the State Conservation Commission. This survey is conducted from mid-January to mid-February, when the wintering populations are most stable, and after the Christmas Counts have been completed.

Cooperators are asked to select a township and survey it for all raptors on a day when the weather is suitable (i.e., not foggy, raining, snowing or too windy). Much of the survey can be done by driving county roads, but those townships with considerable topographic variation require some walking. Types of habitats (e.g. woodland, plowed crop ground, unplowed crop ground, pasture), and percentage of each, are recorded. All raptors are recorded, although it is biased toward those diurnal species.

The goal of the project is to (a) eventually arrive at an estimate of the wintering population of raptors (particularly diurnal species); (b) determine the location of the best wintering habitat in Iowa; (c) determine long-term trends in wintering raptors in Iowa.

Directions, field forms, and copies of 1985 results will be sent out in late December or early January. <u>It is important that</u> <u>participants have experience in</u> <u>field identification of birds of</u> prey.

SONGBIRD PACKAGES

The State Forest Nursery grows tree and shrub seedlings for conservation plantings. The nursery has wildlife and songbird packages available again this year.

The wildlife package is geared toward rural landowners. It contains 50 conifers, 50 hardwoods, and 100 shrubs at a cost of \$19.00. City dwellers can order the songbird package for enhancing their yards for wildlife. This package includes 20 shrubs with high food and cover value and costs \$10.00.

1986 WINTER BIRD FEEDER SURVEY

SPONSORED BY THE IOWA ORNITHOLOGISTS UNION

AND THE IOWA CONSERVATION COMMISSION NONGAME PROGRAM

On two consecutive days during January 23-26, 1986, observe your feeder and using this form, describe your feeder and record the birds that visited you. In the space provided, list <u>highest number</u> of each species that you saw <u>together at any one time</u>. For example, if you saw 10 juncoes at 9:00, 11 at 12:00 and 7 at 4:00, the number you should record is <u>11</u>. If additional individuals of the species could be identified by unusual markings, sex, race, etc., record the total. For example, if you saw 3 male cardinals at 9:00, 10:00 and 3:00 and at 11:00 you saw a female cardinal, the number you should record is <u>4</u>. Use the space below for any species not listed. Count only on the two consecutive days and record only the birds that you see at your feeder, under your feeder or in the trees around your feeder. Do not count the flock of crows that you saw flying overhead or the robin that you saw 3 miles away on your way to visit a friend. If you cannot get an exact count, record your best estimate. An honest estimate is far more useful to me than 'umpteen' or 'too many to count.'
