Fall 2007 IOU Meeting Wrap-up

Birding enthusiasts from all corners of Iowa and six states gathered in Ankeny for the 2007 Iowa Ornithologists' Union Fall Meeting. Registered participants hit a total of 129 birders not including several people who stopped in to say hello or visit long time friends. Veteran attendees remarked that this number was a high for recent years. The Missouri contingent topped the out of state list with twelve birders attending. Hosting the event was Dr. Steve Dinsmore. The weekend started off Friday evening with registration and a social gathering at the Best Western Metro North from 6:00 to 9:00PM. Dr. Dinsmore challenged everyone to test out his/her identification skills. The test was a "Look! Handle the stick, but do NOT touch the specimen" involving a series of study skins from the Iowa State University collection. Participants were given 24 hours to submit their answers.

From the President



The **Fall Meeting in Ankeny** was unique in several ways. In recent years, our Fall Meeting has typically been in September. Steve Dinsmore, ISU professor and meeting organizer, wanted to try a later fall meeting held near Lakes Red Rock and Saylorville in an attempt to find grebes, loons, scoters, gulls and sparrows. Apparently the IOU membership agreed that this was a great idea—129 people attended the October 26-28th weekend and saw some great birds, including White-winged and Surf Scoter, Pacific Loon, Western Grebe, Spotted Towhee and Northern Shrike. Unfortunately, a Cave Swallow (apparently a first state record) seen by Steve at Saylorville on Friday was not listed among the meeting's total of 123 species, as it did not reappear during Saturday-Sunday field trips.

Dr. Jim Rising, author of <u>Sparrows of the United States</u> and <u>Canada</u>, was our guest speaker. Rising, a professor at the University of Toronto, spent the entire weekend with us and truly enjoyed himself. His presentation following the Saturday banquet featured his research on North American sparrows, their diagnostic characteristics and behaviors. Many in attendance brought their copies of his book and he responded by providing autographs for all.

Upcoming events include the March 2008 IOUsponsored trip to Southern California led by Jim Fuller and Bill Scheible and the May 9-11 Spring Meeting in Oskaloosa, featuring banquet speaker Dr. David Lambeth of the University of North Dakota.

The months between our Spring Meeting in Sioux City and our Fall Meeting in Ankeny have been busy ones for the IOU Board. During that time we have:

> (I) Eliminated the administrative position of Registrar and created the new position of Membership Coordinator. Doug Hunt has been our Registrar, a position created by the Board to keep the membership list updated, to contact delinquent members and to mail copies of our journal, Iowa Bird Life, out to the membership. The publisher now handles the mailing of journals and the Treasurer maintains the membership list online. Thus, we have modified the duties of the Registrar, have renamed the position, and have focused the major duties around sustainability of membership. The IOU is good at getting new people to join our group, but we also lose a lot of members each year. The Membership Coordinator will work with the Membership Committee to make personal contacts with non-renewing members in an attempt to retain as many of them as possible.

(2) Worked with the **Internal Revenue Service** to submit the 990 forms required of nonprofit organizations with revenues exceeding \$25,000 per year. Until about 2003 the IOU did not take in these kinds of revenues. With several estate bequests during this time period, our revenues in the past few years have exceeded this mark without the organization being aware of the need for submittal of the forms. The IRS levied automatic fines amounting to just under \$4200, despite the fact that we submitted the forms immediately after learning of the requirement. But IOU officers appealed these fines and were successful in having them dropped. See page 11.

Check out the new **Ann Barker Memorial Library** found on the IOU website at <u>http://library.iowabirds.org/</u>. All but the last two years of <u>Iowa Bird Life</u> can be found there, dating back to the first issue from 1933 (the last two years of <u>Iowa Bird Life</u> are available on our website to members only). The issues are searchable using keywords. Ann Barker, a past President of the IOU (1991-95) provided the union with a \$10,000 bequest that has helped pay for the online library, which to date has cost approximately \$6,000.

Saturday and Sunday both began with breakfast at 6:00AM. The near record numbers required adding a couple of last minute field trips to handle the larger than expected number of participants. Caravans departed at 7:00AM for various points around Saylorville Lake and Lake Red Rock.

Interesting birds seen were Black-and-white Warbler, Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow, Pacific Loon, Gray Partridge, Black-crowned Night-Heron, and American Woodcock. The species total was 123.

Eight new IOU members were welcomed during the afternoon General Member's meeting. Each received a copy of *Birds In Iowa* by T. Kent and J. Dinsmore as a welcoming gift. Other afternoon events included an update from Dinsmore on the Breeding Bird Atlas project, and a photo presentation by Ty Smedes.

Dr. Rising of the University of Toronto, Canada, capped off the Saturday night banquet with an outstanding audio/visual presentation on sparrows. Co-author of "The History of Sparrows in the United States and Canada," Dr. Rising was both entertaining and knowledgeable. The audience responded with numerous questions.

Dr. Rising spent the entire weekend with us traveling on field trips and visiting with anyone about anything bird related. His greatest desire is to inspire as many people as he can to work towards securing and setting aside additional habitat for animals and birds. His honorarium was gifted back to the IOU for use in a project related somehow to land acquisition. On the trip to the airport he remarked on the depth of knowledge demonstrated by the birders he met, the quality of birding in Iowa, and the friendliness of everyone he came in contact with during the meeting. He spent considerdable time personalizing many books brought to the meeting by IOU members, and said he would be glad to participate again in the future.

The 2008 Spring IOU meeting will be held May 9-11, 2008 in Oskaloosa. Hosts will be Doug and Mary Beth Hunt. Dr. David Lambeth of the University of North Dakota will be our banquet speaker. Dr. Lambeth is well known for his expertise in birding the pothole and prairie areas of North Dakota.

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2007 Listing Totals

Iowa bird species list totals as of December 31, 2007 may be submitted to the *IOU News* by using the form at the right, or may be sent by email. Totals will be published in the Spring issue, 2008. Current Iowa records by state, county and month can be found in the 2007 Summer issue of *IOU News* (Volume 23, number 2).

For many birders, keeping list totals is both informative and fun, and generating these totals helps motivate birders to stay active, and perhaps to explore new areas. This process contributes to our learning more about the presence of birds in Iowa, which is a principal objective of the IOU.

The Iowa Lifetime Total List is the category with the largest participation. Last year, 33 people contributed their state total for inclusion in this list. This particular list is defined slightly differently by different birders, for example, some birders only list birds they have found, personally. For others, the collection of personally found birds is a subset of their state life list. So, following the suggestions of IOU members, we are into our third year of including a **Personally Found** list category. This list tracks birds found by the lister without prior knowledge of recent birds or recurring birds of the listed species at that site.

Several years ago, the *IOU News* introduced two awards for Iowa birders who enjoy listing their sightings. These awards are intended to acknowledge Iowa's most active birders, and to promote birding in Iowa.

Top Annual List. This award acknowledges the IOU member with the top annual list for the previous year. To be eligible, the participant must submit the species list, and any sightings of casual or accidental species must be accepted by the IOU Records Committee. For the 2006 year, this award went to *Jay Gilliam*, who observed 304 species in Iowa during the year, the second year in a row he has recorded more than 300 species in the state. **Top Percent of Life List**. This award is intended for the IOU member with the highest percent of his/her life list seen in the calendar year. To be eligible, this member's life list must have been previously published.

Other popular list categories are yard list totals, and individual county list totals. Included also is an opportunity to list a birder's **County Total Ticks**, that is, the sum of all individual county totals.

Another popular listing activity is the **Big Day**. A Big Day is a group affair in which participants attempt to record in a single day, in a particular geographic region, as many species as they can find. We ask that participants follow ABA Big Day rules and adhere to the ABA Birding Code of Ethics. For new record totals in a category, please submit the species list and consider writing a short narrative about the adventure for publication in this newsletter.

Eagle Lake Wetlands Bird Conservation Area Dedication

FOREST CITY - A ceremony to dedicate the Eagle Lake Wetland Complex as Iowa's newest Bird Conservation Area (BCA) will take place Wednesday, December 19, at 1:30 p.m., at the Faculty Lounge in the Waldorf College Student Center, at the intersection of S.8th St. & W. I St.

The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is hosting the dedication that will include brief presentations and the unveiling of a special Bird Conservation Area sign. Following the ceremony, there will be a short driving tour of the area.

The Eagle Lake Wetlands area is one of Iowa's largest and most important remaining wetland complexes. "Designating the Eagle Lake Wetland Complex as a Bird Conservation Area will add to its recognition by indicating its importance for nesting and migratory grassland and wetland birds," said Bruce Ehresman, DNR wildlife diversity program biologist. "This area provides important nesting habitat for declining grassland birds, such as Northern Harrier, Bobolink, Sedge Wren, and meadowlarks; for declining wetland species like Black and Forster's terns, American Bittern, and Redhead ducks; plus the area provides nesting and migration stopover habitat for many other bird species suffering nationwide declines."

Former IOU President Visits Iowa

Former Iowa Ornithologists' Union President Ed Kozicky visited Ames on 6 October, his first visit to Iowa in many years. From 1948-1956, Kozicky was the Leader of the Iowa Coop-

erative Wildlife Research Unit at Iowa State College, now Iowa State University. While in Iowa, Kozicky was active in the I.O.U. and served as President of the organization from 1953-1954. He directed the work of several graduate students, most of whom studied Ring-necked Pheasants or Northern Bobwhite. The results of several of those studies were published in Iowa Bird Life (e.g., vol. 27, pp. 63-69). In 1956, Kozicky left Ames to work for the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation where he was in charge of their conservation program for many years. He was back in Ames to help celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Iowa Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit. That unit, founded in 1932 through the efforts of J. N. "Ding" Darling, was the first one established in the nation. Kozicky has outlived all I.O.U. presidents previous to his term and at 92, continues to be active at his home in East Alton, Illinois.

WINTER FIELD REPORTS Bob Cecil

For many, winter birding involves a Christmas Bird Count or two and hoping something good shows up at the feeder. While it's hard to blame them, there's a lot to see in those chilly Iowa landscapes. Beginning just in 2004, Iowa birders have found Harlequin Duck, Barrow's Goldeneye, Iceland Gull, California Gull, Slaty-backed Gull, Black-legged Kittiwake, Red-breasted Sapsucker, Ferruginous Hawk, Northern Hawk-Owl, Great Gray Owl, Bohemian Waxwing, Lark Bunting, Golden-crowned Sparrow, Black-headed Grosbeak, Brambling, and Hoary Redpoll. Bring back some memories? But while every winter season holds the promise of excitement, this one may be special.

Already, a Black-tailed Gull lingered into the winter season, continuing to bring in flocks of birders from around

the country, but, more importantly for winter birders, we may have a winter finch invasion. That one event that many of us had lost hope for is a possibility, presaged by early Red Crossbill, Common Redpoll, and Pine Siskin, and indications of others on the way. A failed cone crop up north is blamed, and it appears that the conifers here have plenty to offer them should they decide to visit. So get out the feeders, get out into the field, and be sure to get your field reports to me by 3 Mar. We may have another opportunity to observe and chronicle a winter irruption of northern species.

If you are able, please submit your report via www.iowabirds.org. I simply enter my observations as I make them, meaning no deadlines in getting my report in. It is quick, easy, and eliminates transcription errors.

Some Correspondence with the IRS

A note from the IOU Treasurer

Non-profit organizations with gross revenues exceeding \$25,000 must file informational 990 forms with the IRS in order to maintain their tax exempt status. Historically the IOU annual revenues had not exceeded \$25,000 until 2004. In that year, the IOU received two bequests that put revenues in excess of the \$25,000 mark. Unfortunately, 990 forms were not filed. The oversight was not caught until this summer.

There is no penalty for filing a form when revenues are under \$25,000, but there is always a penalty assessed for **not** filing a form when revenues are over \$25,000. In this case, the penalty assessed the IOU was just under \$4,200. We responded by filing the appropriate forms, and an appeal was made to waive the penalty. The IOU received good news in early December that the appeal was successful and <u>a waiver</u> of all fees was granted.

It is doubtful we would be as lucky with a second violation, so a policy has been implemented of filing the form yearly whether or not revenues are over \$25,000.
